New Courses

Native American Studies (NATIVAM)

170 Introduction to American Indian Studies (3) CSU

Lecture 3 hours.

Students examine American Indian cultures in North America from early cultures to contemporary society. A cross-disciplinary approach examines applicable methods and theories that inform the distinct cultural and political organization, analyze and articulate concepts such as race, ethnicity, equity, ethnocentrism, self-determination, liberation, and settler colonialism by applying theory and knowledge produced by Native Americans.

171 History of American Indian Nations (3) CSU

Lecture 3 hours.

This course focuses on the historical, economic, and cultural development of American Indian Peoples-Nations in the Americas, especially in relationship to the United States. Emphasis is upon ancient, imperial, colonial and contemporary relationships including the historical themes of sovereignty, treaty-making, constitutional development, frontiers and the reservation era, race, resistance, revitalization, ethnogenesis, assimilation, decolonization and resilience of American Indian Nations histories, sources, traditions, identities and communities.

New C-ID Approvals for Courses

Communication Studies (COMM)

103 Persuasion (3) UC:CSU

Lecture 3 hours.

Prerequisite: English 101 with a grade of "C" or better.

This course focuses on composition, critical thinking, inductive and deductive reasoning, fallacies, persuasive writing, theories of strategic communication in persuasive messages, campaigns, advertisements and argumentation.

C-ID: COMM 190

Health

008 Women's Personal Health (3) *UC:CSU

Lecture 3 hours.

In this course, Women's Personal Health, students will examine Socio-cultural influences, 7-dimensions of wellness, holistic health options, and factors that contribute to the overall well-being of women's health such as: breast and cervical cancer, cardiovascular disease risk factors, stress management, menopause/PMS, birth control/pregnancy, Sexually Transmitted Diseases and disease prevention.

C-ID: PH 116

*UC Credit Limit: Health 002, 007, 008, 011 and 043, any or all of these courses combined: maximum credit, one course.

011 Principles of Healthful Living (3) *UC:CSU

Lecture 3 hours.

Not an activity class.

Note: Credit given for either Health 10 or Health 011, but not both.

In this course, students will examine health concepts to use today and tomorrow as guidelines for self-directed responsible living. Emphasis is placed on relating health concepts to the student's mental, emotional, spiritual, and physical well-being. Topics include nutrition, exercise, weight control, mental health, stress management, violence, substance abuse, reproductive health, disease prevention, aging, healthcare, and environmental hazards and safety.

C-ID: PHS 100PH 100

*UC Credit Limit: Health 002, 007, 008, 011 and 043, any or all of these courses combined: maximum credit, one course.

101 Introduction to Public Health (3) UC:CSU

Lecture 3 hours.

This course provides an introduction to the discipline of Public Health. Students explore the basic concepts and terminologies of public health and the history and accomplishments of public health officials and agencies. An overview of the functions of various public health professions and institutions and an in-depth examination of the core public health disciplines are covered. Topics of the field include the epidemiology of infectious and chronic disease; prevention and control of diseases in the community, including the analysis of the social determinants of health and strategies for eliminating disease, illness, and health disparities among various populations; community organizing and health promotion programming; environmental health and safety; global health; and health care policy and management.

C-ID: PH 101

102 Health and Social Justice (3) UC:CSU

Lecture 3 hours.

This course provides an introduction to the health inequities in the United States that stem from unequal living conditions. Students will explore how education, socioeconomic status, racism, and gender shape health epidemics and policy development. Fundamental theories to advocate for health and social justice will be explored, and community organizing approaches will be practiced.

C-ID: PH 102

Smoking Policy

Smoking is not permitted in any classroom or other enclosed facility. Smoking is permitted in designated areas only.

OVERVIEW

Los Angeles Pierce College is committed to providing a safe and healthy environment for its students, employees, and visitors. In light of evidence that the use of tobacco and nicotine as well as exposure to secondhand smoke and aerosol (commonly referred to as "vapor") from electronic smoking devices pose significant health and environmental hazards, the College has established a smoke, vapor and tobacco-free environment.

PROVISIONS

The smoke and tobacco free policy includes all Los Angeles Pierce College indoor and outdoor areas. Smoking and the use of any tobacco product is prohibited at all times on all College properties, grounds and buildings within the Los Angeles Pierce College, including parking lots and within personal vehicles on College property.

This regulation applies to employees, students, visitors, and other persons who enter any College property as described above.

Such products will also not be sold or distributed on campus property.

No advertising or marketing of such products shall be permitted on College property or in publications produced by the College.

Except as provided below, Tobacco is not permitted on any College Owned or Leased Property, including any portions of such Property that may have been previously designated smoking areas.

- Tobacco Use may be permitted in connection with research if it adheres to all federal and state regulatory requirements, EH&S health and safety guidelines, or in connection with research approved in writing by the UCLA Institutional Review Board or Animal Research Committee.
- Smoking or Tobacco Use may be permitted for traditional ceremonial activities of recognized cultural and/or religious groups with prior written approval of the sponsoring department, the LAPC Events Office and the Fire Marshal's Office.

DEFINITIONS

"Electronic Smoking Device" means an electronic device that may be used to deliver any aerosolized or vaporized substance to the person inhaling from the device, including but not limited to, an e-cigarette, e-cigar, e-pipe, vape pen, or e-hookah.

"Smoking" means inhaling, exhaling, or burning any tobacco, nicotine, cannabis, or plant product, whether natural or synthetic, such as cigar, cigarette, cigarillo, pipe, or any other lighted, heated, or activated tobacco, nicotine, cannabis or plant product intended for inhalation. "Smoking" also means using an electronic smoking device or hookah.

"Tobacco Product" means any product containing, made from, or derived from tobacco or nicotine that is intended for human consumption or is likely to be consumed, whether smoked, heated, chewed, absorbed, dissolved, inhaled, snorted, sniffed, or ingested by any other means, including, but not limited to cigarettes, cigars, little cigars, chewing tobacco, pipe tobacco, snuff, or snus; and any electronic smoking device and any substances that may be aerosolized or vaporized by such device, whether or not the substance contains nicotine. "Tobacco Product" does not include a product that has been approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration for sale as a tobacco treatment product marketed and sold solely for such an approved purpose.

Geographic Information Systems (GIS)

036 Cartography and Base Map Development Cartographic Design and Visualization (3) UC:CSU

Lecture 2 hours. Laboratory 2 hours.

Corequisite: Concurrent enrollment in Geography 025 or Geographic Information Systems 025. Previous completion of Geography 025 or Geographic Information Systems 025 with a grade of "C" or better is allowable.

Same as Geography 036. Credit not given for both courses.

Students will receive a comprehensive study of GIS cartography including cartographic principles, data acquisition methods used in map production, and methods of base map development. The course will include an in depth study of cartography (history, principles, map projections, scales, and map accuracy). Methods of data acquisition will include the basic principles used in remote sensing, aerial images and the use of Global Positioning Systems (GPS) in the field for map feature locations. Techniques used in GIS base map development (scanning, digitizing and coordinate geometry) will also be introduced. The course will include production of professional quality maps using ArcGIS software. This course will introduce students to cartographic design principles and map development. The course will review the cartographic principles, data acquisition methods in map production, and development of web maps and web applications. The course will include basics of designing principles in cartography, symbolizing thematic maps, customizing symbols, data acquisition and processing from online sources, and map development techniques. The course will include the production of professional quality printed maps using Esri's ArcGIS Pro/Arc GIS Software and development of web interactive maps using ArcGIS Online Maps and Webapps.

Geography (GEOG)

036 Cartography and Base Map Development Cartographic Design and Visualization (3) UC:CSU Lecture 2 hours. Laboratory 2 hours.

Corequisite: Concurrent enrollment in Geography 025 or Geographic Information Systems 025. Previous completion of Geography 025 or Geographic Information Systems 025 with a grade of "C" or better is allowable.

Same as Geographic Information Systems 036. Credit not given for both courses.

Students will receive a comprehensive study of GIS cartography including cartographic principles, data acquisition methods used in map production, and methods of base map development. The course will include

an in depth study of cartography (history, principles, map projections, scales, and map accuracy). Methods of data acquisition will include the basic principles used in remote sensing, aerial images and the use of Global Positioning Systems (GPS) in the field for map feature locations. Techniques used in GIS base map development (scanning, digitizing and coordinate geometry) will also be introduced.
